Honorary Board Begins to Grow!

Thanks to the efforts of NRAF President Don Fowler and new Honorary Board Chairman Jim Santini, the NRAF Honorary Board has already begun to grow! Robert Morrill, who lives in the Bay Area but is a Nevada native and long time supporter, was the first to answer the call. He was followed by Bill Cannon, a BLM Archaeologist from the northern lobe of the Great Basin (Lakeview, Oregon) and a long time rock art researcher. Now David Hurst Thomas has also "come-on-board-The-Board." Dave has done a lot of significant archaeological work in Nevada (including at a number of rock art sites in central Nevada) although he currently lives a little further east, where he is the Curator of Anthropology at the American Museum of Natural History in New York City. Site Stewardship Moving Forward in the High Basins

The first gathering of High Basins Site Stewards was held on September 10th. Chris Miller, from

the Nevada Bureau of Land Management, explained the

requirements and expectations of a site steward. Stewards were assigned sites to monitor and given instructions on protocols and procedures. It was a very enthusiastic group and the rock art of the High Basins is now in very good hands... but more help is needed! Project News Lagomarsino Update

Because of the heat volunteers weren't able to stay in the field much past lunchtime, but in spite of the short field days in July, we now have almost 300 panels fully

completed including photography and field drawings inked after 8 only days in the field! There were on average 12 people each day in the field and 2-3 stayed back at the Virginia City Seniors Center to finalize field drawings. We're all looking forward to getting back out there in October – by then those basalt boulders will have cooled off! This site is certainly one of the most spectacular in the state and we'll be there for 9 days – so this time there are days to fit any schedule and as a bonus – we won't have to be on-site at daybreak to beat the heat! If you haven't already sent in your registration form to work at Lagomarsino – you'd better do it now! You will have to attend a one-hour orientation the evening before your first workday at 7pm.

Near Winnemucca

The project near Winnemucca was a great success and fun for all! In spite of being a bit short-handed (only six NRAF members were on-site), we managed to get the **entire main site recorded** (26 panels... some of them pretty complicated!) along with 3 panels at a second site that we hadn't planned on doing and 9 panels at a third site just for good measure! will take more than a washout and a little bit of a rough slope to keep an NRAF member from getting a look at a really great rock art panel (in spite of bionic parts)!

Southern Projects -

One of the most interesting and unique areas in southern Nevada is the location of an upcoming project by NRAF members in the south! **December 6-8 - we'll be working** for the BLM on a small number of sites in Arrow Canyon, and if you haven't seen this area, it's one you won't want to miss! Most of us who are passionate about rock art are aware of the



changes in visibility that lighting can make. Morning versus afternoon lighting of course makes a difference but in Arrow Canyon, we also must observe seasonal rules of illumination.

For instance, the glyphs on Katchina Rocks are visible only in the season of the katchinas (summer) and disappear entirely in the winter, as do katchinas themselves. Distinctive also because of the wonderful shield figures and scalloped rocks, Arrow Canyon summons us for repeated visits. And those who love the challenge of assigning styles to rock art need to come record **Kirk's Grotto in February**. Basin and Range Tradition petroglyphs may dominate but there is a dash of Puebloan motifs and what may be lower Colorado River peoples' work thrown in for good measure. The exceptional light inside the Grotto helps instill a feeling of awe in this extraordinary place. This site will be a challenge but well worth the effort and if you haven't been to many sites in the southern part of the state there is little that will prepare you for the sites you will see there. More information on Kirk's Grotto will follow in the January Great Basin Glyph Notes – so keep watching these pages!

Training Schedule

In the Northern part of the state the next training session will be October 18-19, but rather than being held at the Nevada State Museum in Carson City as it usually is, we'll be

meeting in Virginia City! In order to accommodate people who want to have training so that they can work at Lagomarsino, we've decided to combine them both together! Rather than the full 5 hours in class for the first day, a 2 hour orientation will be held on Saturday evening in Virginia City (4-6pm) and the next day



will be spent learning field techniques alongside more experienced recorders. This is really the ideal way to learn the process – so reserve your place now – this one is sure to fill up quickly (limit 20)!



Training in the southern part of the state will be held November 8-9 at the US Forest Service Office on Torrey Pines Blvd. The first day will include a rock art overview (pictures from around the world, discussion of current theory, dating and methodology), along with

conservation practices and opportunities. The second day will be out in the field recording a small site for the US Forest Service in the Spring Mountains. Training will again be limited to 20 and to register and get directions to the USFS office, please contact Elaine Holmes (kokopelli3@cox.net) or 702.645.7540.

Upcoming Events


Our First Annual Membership Meeting – the "Rock Art Round-Up" will be held January 17-18 in Overton! A full day of project summaries (both completed and upcoming), procedural instruction and awards will be followed by a bar-be-que generously hosted by the Lost City Museum and an evening presentation by a "special guest speaker." The second day will be field trips to a number of the areas' fabulous sites, including some in the Gold Butte area which has recently become the focus of intense interest. The landscape is breathtaking and the rock art truly awesome, so mark your calendars now! Pricing has yet to be set, but will be in the area of \$40-50 to cover expenses and food. Camping locations will be available and there are several hotels in Overton to accommodate those who don't like sleeping on the ground! A "preregistration" form has already been mailed out so that we can begin to get an idea of numbers of attendees and potential costs, so if you'd like to come, make sure you get that form mailed back to Elaine Holmes 4740 Cimarron Rd. Our **first group tour** is going to be offered in the spring of 2004 to the incredible Coso Ranges of south-central California, located on the Naval Weapons Station. We're working closely with the archaeologist in charge and may be able to gain access to both Little Petroglyph Canyon and Horse Canyon (a locality not generally included in the tour). We're looking at a weekend in April to make the trip. While still inside the Great Basin, the rock art in the Cosos is like no other! We are currently investigating tour options (bus vs private vehicles and whether we can get better pricing on accommodations if we book as a group, etc), but if you're interested in finding out more information as it becomes available, contact Janice Hoke (janice@abaris.com). 

Code of Ethics

The Nevada Rock Art Foundation subscribes to the following Code of Ethics and encourages its members, as a condition of membership, to abide by the standards of conduct stated herein.

- 1. NRAF members will be respectful at rock art sites many are regarded as sacred by indigenous peoples and as such will be treated as a valued part of our shared cultural heritage.
- 2. All local, state, and national antiquities laws will be strictly adhered to by the membership of NRAF.All research or educational activities taking place at rock art sites shall be subject to appropriate regulations and property access requirements.

- All rock art recording shall be nondestructive with regard to the rock art itself and the associated archaeological remains which may be present.
- 4. NO artifacts shall be collected unless the work is done as part of a legally constituted program of archaeological survey or excavation and with express permission of the land holder.
- 5. No excavation shall be conducted unless the work is done as part of a legally constituted excavation project and with the express permission of the land holder. Removal of soil shall not be undertaken at any time for the sole purpose of exposing subsurface rock art.
